


Financial protection from dilapidating illnesses like cancer reduces poverty incidence.




Providing free-of-cost quality treatment enables achievement of health-related targets.

IHHN'S INTERVENTION



CLINICAL

IHHN has one of the largest childhood cancer units in Pakistan with a capacity of 85 beds. The sub-specialty services include Leukemia, Lymphomas, Solid tumors, Neuro-oncology, and Palliative care. It regularly administers chemotherapy sessions in cancer patients with surgeries if required. IHHN receives patients from all over Pakistan and neighboring countries.



OUTREACH

IHHN makes a concerted effort to reduce the financial burden of travel and relocation on patients through two novel approaches. It facilitates the treatment of patients at hospitals in various cities across Pakistan to ensure easy access to treatment. It also conducts training and knowledge-sharing programs to equip hospitals to deal with childhood cancer patients independently.



PSYCHOSOCIAL

IHHN recognizes children's learning, cognitive development, and mental wellbeing are very critical for the overall patient care and recovery process. IHHN has a dedicated psychosocial counselling program to cater to the mental health needs of patients and their families.



It was a pleasant Saturday morning and seventeen-year-old Saim was preparing for a football match at his school in Karachi. Little did he know his life was about to change forever.

In the middle of the training, he was struck by a severe, throbbing pain in his back. Unable to comprehend what was happening to him, he collapsed on the field and was sent home right away. Saim's father examined his back hoping the pain is only a result of his physical activity. To his horror, he felt a lump on Saim's back and immediately rushed him to the nearest hospital. Belonging to a lower-middle-class family, Saim's father collected whatever money has had saved for his son's school fees and took him for some tests. Finally, Siam received a diagnosis that changed his life forever. He had Bone Cancer.

Saim's family began to scramble for his treatment. But the response they received from doctors was very disheartening. "They told us the chances of survival are negligible for my son. And their hefty fees meant even if we wanted to take our chances we couldn't afford to.

"The family was devastated and desperate. Here was their only son, so young and full of potential and they were on the edge of losing him.

Finally, Allah (SWT) listened to their prayers and they found out about Indus Hospital & Health Network's free of charge cancer treatment. Saim was admitted immediately and started treatment.

During treatment, Saim would spend his time looking at other patients' stories on his phone. "I would scroll through Indus's website. Watch videos of cancer survivors. It gave me hope in the darkest time of my life. When I had long chemotherapy sessions, I remember I felt utterly hopeless. But Nafisa and Hadia Baji (counselors at Indus) would always be there for me."

After a year of treatment, Saim was declared cancer free! He is now studying Pre-Engineering and hopes to take his parents for Hajj one day. He and his family are grateful to Indus Hospital for providing free cancer treatment to him.



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
